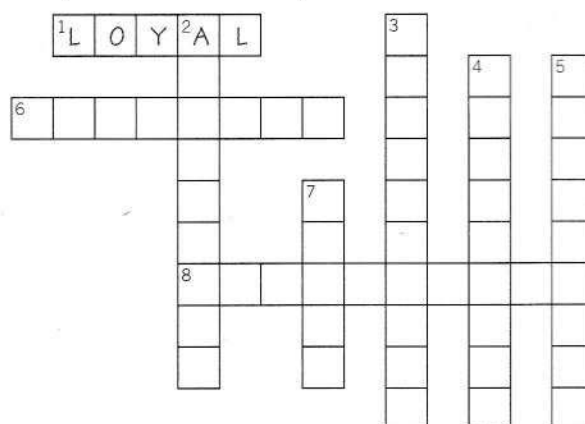

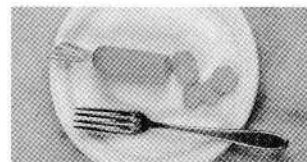

Face-to-face texting

A lot of people think that technology brings people closer together, but I'm not so sure. People spend so much time texting and looking at computer screens that they hardly ever speak to one another. This made me think and I decided to do a little experiment.

One day my husband and I decided not to speak to each other at all. We could email, text, etc. but we couldn't actually communicate in words. So, at breakfast he sent me a text to ask if I wanted any more toast and I replied that I didn't but I wouldn't mind another cup of tea.

We both thought it was funny at first, but things got more complicated as the day went on. For example, a friend phoned me about a special party she was organising. I had to text my husband for about 20 minutes to discuss everything.

The whole thing made me appreciate that nothing can replace face-to-face communication – talking to each other. Communication may be easier because of technology, but people aren't machines. We sometimes forget that simple things are often the most important in life.

Before Nick Vujicic was born, his parents had no idea that he would go on to have any medical problems – none of the medical checks had ever shown a problem. However, when he was born, it was clear that his life would be different from that of other babies. Growing up would not be easy. His parents decided to send him to a normal school, where he would use a wheelchair, and where there were carers available to assist him. The experience was difficult, but Nick feels it was the best decision his parents could have made, because it would give him a sense of independence. Unsurprisingly, when he was at school, he sometimes felt depressed and lonely, and was sometimes bullied. But he always had the support of his loyal friends and family, and these people made him determined to overcome many problems. He even went on to study at university, where he was awarded a degree in Financial Planning and Real Estate. What surprises many people is just how optimistic Nick can be, and how many different things he has managed to do. Much of this is down to his parents. His father put him in the water for the first time when he was 18 months, so that Nick would be self-confident enough to swim when he was older. He has one small foot which he can use to help him move around in the water. He is able to operate a computer by using the toe on this foot to type, something he learned to do when he was just six years old. And when he plays golf – yes, he even plays golf – he is able to hold the golf club under his chin.

A big part of Nick's life now is giving motivational talks. He travels around the world and has shared his inspiring story with millions of people, speaking to audiences in packed stadiums. Nick's message is that you should never give up, and that people should love themselves even when they fail.

TERRIFYING ANIMALS

The animal kingdom is full of frightening creatures – animals you definitely wouldn't want to see close up, apart from perhaps in a zoo. Here are four very different – but equally terrifying – animals.

THE GREAT WHITE SHARK

Most people have heard of this animal – made famous in the *Jaws* films of the 1970s and 1980s. The great white shark has a reputation for being a killer, but perhaps unfairly, as these animals don't normally hunt humans – elephants kill more people than sharks do. But the problem for sports lovers is that a person swimming on top of a surfboard can, to a shark below the water, look very similar to a seal – its food of preference. If a great white shark does attack a human, the results are not always deadly – it's believed that sharks don't like the taste of humans.

THE KOMODO DRAGON

The Komodo dragon is a very large lizard – it can grow as long as three metres and weigh up to 70 kg. Experts think Komodo dragons are related to ancient lizards from Australia, but they're now found only in some islands in Indonesia. They are probably most famous for their unusual methods of killing. When hunting, they attack but don't kill the other animal right away. This is because they have a poisonous bite, so after attacking the animal, they follow it until it dies from the poison, a job made easier thanks to their excellent sense of smell. While attacks on humans are rare, they can and do happen.


THE TIGER

The tiger is another animal that's probably familiar to most people, even though very few of us have ever seen one in the wild. Tigers have fascinated us since ancient times, and are very important to a number of cultures in Asia – they are the national animal of Bangladesh, India, Vietnam, Malaysia and South Korea. Tigers are the largest of all the cat species; they're fast runners, not to mention excellent swimmers. The good news is that they generally avoid contact with people, although they do attack, particularly when humans start to move into their natural habitats. It should also be added that tigers are now endangered and it's thought that humans play a very large role in this.

THE FUNNEL-WEB SPIDER

Many people are afraid of spiders, although the vast majority are completely harmless to humans. But there are of course a number of species that can be dangerous, and the funnel-web spider is certainly among them. This spider's natural habitat is in the area around the Australian city of Sydney. It can be between one and five centimetres long, and is dark blue, brown or black. Unlike many other spiders, this species can be quite aggressive when it comes into contact with humans. When it attacks, it holds on tight and can bite several times. A bite from a Sydney funnel-web spider is extremely painful and can kill quickly, although bites from the females are less severe. Children are particularly at risk – 42% of attacks involve children rather than adults.

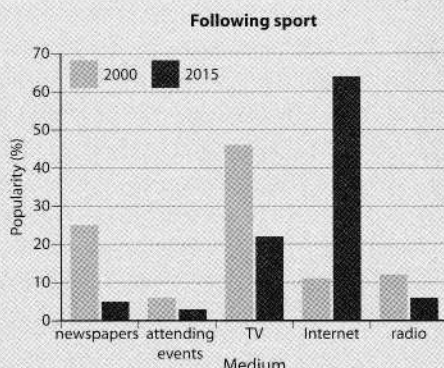

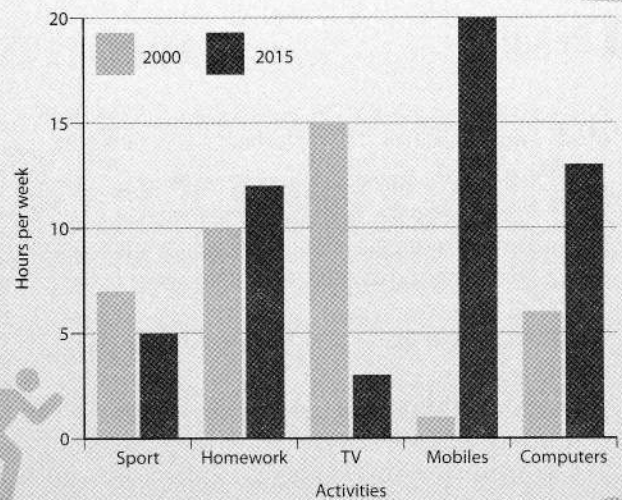

UK teenagers' out-of-school activities

MICHAEL JOHNSON THE MAN IN THE GOLDEN SHOES

Michael Johnson is one of the most successful professional athletes of all time. He won four Olympic gold medals and eight World Championship golds. People used to think that it was impossible for the same person to win the 200 metres as well as the 400 metres, but Johnson won both at the 1996 Atlanta Olympics, setting a new world record for both – 19.32 seconds and 43.49 seconds. He then went on to win the 400 metres again in Sydney in 2000 – the first time anyone had ever won the race in two Olympic Games in a row.

Anyone who saw Johnson perform in a race – even on TV – will remember him. He was an outstanding athlete, of course, but he also had a very unusual running style – short steps and a very straight back. When he was a child, his friends used to laugh at him because of how he ran. They said it was 'funny'. Johnson later said he'd found it funny too, but for another reason – the style was helping him to win all his races.

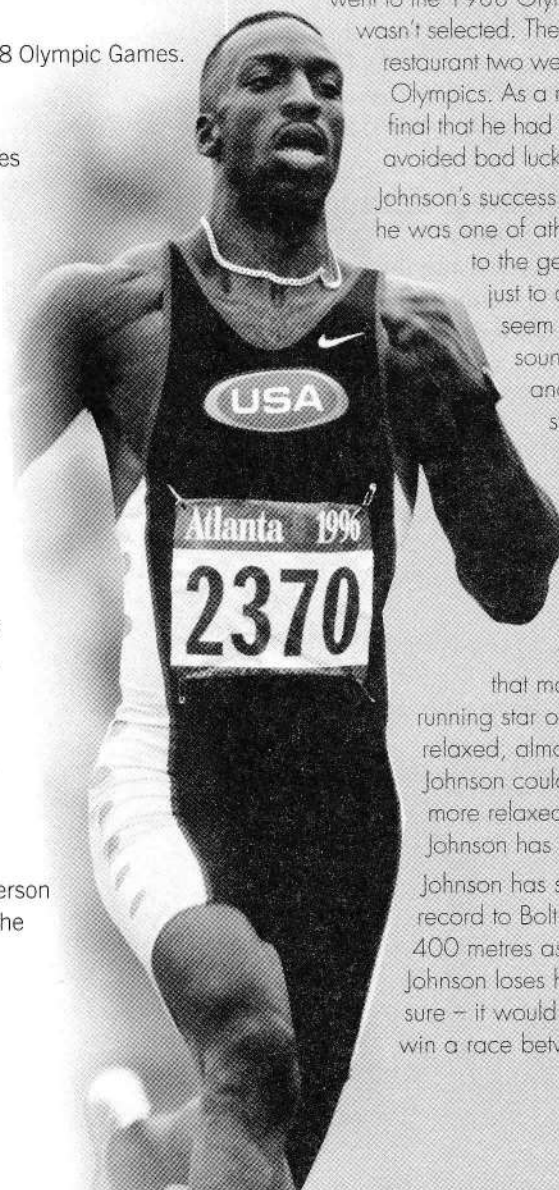
Many people think that with better luck, Johnson might have won even more medals – he was expected to be part of the team which went to the 1988 Olympics, but he had an injury and wasn't selected. Then in 1992, he got ill after eating in a restaurant two weeks before the start of the Barcelona Olympics. As a result, he didn't get as far as the final that he had been expected to win. In 1996, he avoided bad luck and the success story began.

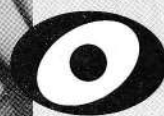
Johnson's success made him rich and famous, and he was one of athletics' first 'superstars' – well known to the general public around the world, not just to athletics fans. But he didn't always seem to enjoy the fame – he sometimes sounded bad tempered in interviews and, with the golden shoes that he started to wear when racing, some called him arrogant. After retiring, he explained that he'd found the press attention annoying.

Johnson, of course, had a natural talent for running, but many people say that it was his ability to focus and his dedication to training

that made him so exceptional. The big running star of today – Usain Bolt – is famously relaxed, almost the opposite of Johnson. Whether Johnson could have run faster if he'd taken Bolt's more relaxed approach is up for debate – Johnson has said he certainly doesn't think so.

Johnson has since lost his 200 metres world record to Bolt and has encouraged him to try the 400 metres as well, even though this might mean Johnson loses his world record. One thing is for sure – it would be fascinating to know who would win a race between Bolt and Johnson at his best.

THE *Five* SECRETS OF HIGHLY OPTIMISTIC PEOPLE

Everyone wants to be an optimist, but it's not always easy – most of us have to try hard to stay positive when life is getting us down. It's worth the effort, though, since optimists enjoy better health and even do better in their careers. Here are five things that optimists do that will help you look on the bright side, even when you're stuck in a traffic jam or forced to work on a Sunday.

The secret to optimism is that it doesn't just happen – highly optimistic people work hard to stay positive. If you want to do well in your career, improve your relationships and enjoy your life, it's time to give optimism a try.

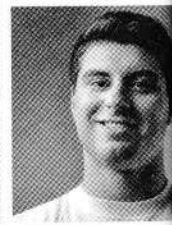
1 Optimists are passionate about their work. Do you need to force yourself to go to work each morning? Optimists don't, because they jump out of bed excited to face the day. This is because optimists have chosen jobs and careers which they genuinely feel passionate about. If you can't remember the last time you enjoyed a day at work, it may be time to start looking for a new job. For optimists, work is more than just an opportunity to earn money. It's also an opportunity to learn, grow and do what they love.

2 Optimists focus on good things, even though it's not the easiest thing to do. According to Florida State University professor Roy F. Baumeister's article, 'Bad Is Stronger Than Good', it's much easier to focus on the rainy days than the sunny ones. In the paper, Baumeister says people are generally more upset about losing \$50 than they are happy to gain \$50. When you start to feel bad-tempered or depressed, think about something good from your day to balance out the negative emotions. Optimists make a choice to focus on the good in their life instead of thinking about the bad.

3 Optimists are more likely to be adventurous and ambitious. Believe in your dreams – and if you have big dreams, you might achieve better results. In 1997, researcher Gary McPherson studied child musicians, their goals and what happened to them later in life. He found that the child musicians who imagined themselves playing their instrument forever were more likely to become professional musicians in the future. So, while belief on its own isn't enough for success, a little dreaming certainly won't hurt.

4 Optimists keep a diary. As we've mentioned, it's very easy to focus on the negative events in our lives and ignore the positives. Keeping a diary can help you release negative energy and focus on positive emotions. During a few quiet moments in your morning or before bed, write a list of the positive moments from your day, or things you're trying to achieve in the future.

5 Optimists surround themselves with good feelings. If you surround yourself with supportive people and things you enjoy, you'll improve your mood and your day. The next time you lose concentration and start looking at videos of cats and dogs on the Internet, don't feel so bad about the time you wasted. Research has shown that spending a few moments doing something you enjoy will actually make you more productive.

WHY DOES LANGUAGE CHANGE?

All languages change over time, and each language varies from place to place. A language may change as a result of social or political pressures. New vocabulary is often required for the latest inventions or ideas. But a language can also change for less obvious reasons.

Influences from other people

Language changes whenever speakers come into contact with each other. No two individuals speak the same way: people from different places clearly speak differently, but even within the same small community, people speak differently depending on their age, gender, origin, and social and educational background. When we interact with these different speakers, in different situations, we hear new words, expressions and pronunciations, and can make them a part of our own speech. Even if your family has lived in the same area for generations, you can probably identify a number of differences between the language you use and the way your grandparents speak or spoke. Every generation contributes to language change and when enough time has passed, the impact of these changes becomes more obvious.

Attitudes to language change

Jonathan Swift, the 18th-century Irish author, once wrote that we should find a way to stop our language changing. Even today, it is common to find this idea – some people think that language should be frozen in time, and protected from fashions and social trends.

Language change is often thought as a negative thing. During the 18th century, Swift and many other people felt the English language was in serious decline and that a national institution – like those that existed in France and Italy – should be created to establish rules and preserve the language. Even today, we hear people complaining about a lack of 'standards' in spoken and written English. New words and expressions, or pronunciations and changes in grammar, are criticised, and are often considered bad.

Change can be a good thing

Most linguists believe that change in language, like any change in society, is unavoidable. Change is a way of keeping a language alive and useful, and gives speakers different ways of saying things with extremely small differences of meaning and ways of expressing entirely new ideas. The academies established in France and Italy have had little success in decreasing the amount of change in French or Italian, and the gradual change in opinion of Dr Johnson – a famous dictionary writer who lived at the same time as Swift – shows how ideas have developed about language change. In 1747, Johnson wrote about his desire to write a dictionary that would fix the pronunciation of English and keep it pure. But when he completed the dictionary ten years later, he admitted in his introduction that fixing a language was impossible. Like it or not, language is always changing and English will go on doing so in many creative and – to some people – annoying ways.

Spring is nearly here and many people will turn their attention to DIY. But a recent survey has found that over 50% of people in the UK admit that they have at least one unfinished job to do in their home, while one in five people say they have caused damage to their home while trying to 'do it themselves'. Here's a selection of our readers' own DIY nightmares.

Matt I was doing quite a simple task – just putting up some shelves in the basement of my house. I was standing on a wooden table, putting a screw into the wall and suddenly I heard a bang and the screwdriver just flew out of my hands. Then, I noticed that all the lights had gone out. I realised there was an electric cable in the wall where I was putting the screw in. I think I was lucky – I could have been badly hurt. But it wasn't all good luck – I had to have some repairs done by a proper electrician and it wasn't cheap.

Steve Once, a friend of mine asked if I could help her to paint some rooms in her house. I was painting one wall, standing at the top of a ladder. For some reason, at one point, I forgot I was on a ladder and I stepped to the side. Where I put my foot there was just air, and of course I lost my balance and fell off the ladder. Unfortunately, as I did this, I knocked the ladder over and spilt the paint all over the carpet. My friend was more worried about me than annoyed about my stupidity, but in the end she had to buy a new carpet ... and she called in professionals to do the painting!

Sarah I live in an old cottage. There's a big attic and it was a real mess – full of piles of old books, bags of clothes, everything. So I decided I would clear it all out and put in some proper cupboards and drawers to keep everything in order. I didn't get very far – after just a few minutes, I banged my head on the roof while I was trying to move a pile of old books. This made me jump back and I put my right foot through the ceiling below. To try and get my balance, I stepped forwards and my whole left leg went through the ceiling. It took days to clean up the mess in the rooms below, and I had to get the two huge holes fixed by a professional. In the end, I decided to leave the attic messy!

Martin I had a tap that I couldn't turn off completely – there was always a bit of water coming out. I kept leaving it because I was too lazy, but one night I couldn't sleep as the sound of the tap was really annoying me. So I decided to try and fix it – in the middle of the night. I tried to turn off the water supply before doing anything, but it was dark, I was half asleep and I ended up turning off the gas by mistake, instead of the water. So when I unscrewed the tap, water started spraying everywhere. I shouted so much I woke up everyone else in the house, and also the neighbours either side of us. It took a long time to clean up all the water and we were all exhausted the next day!

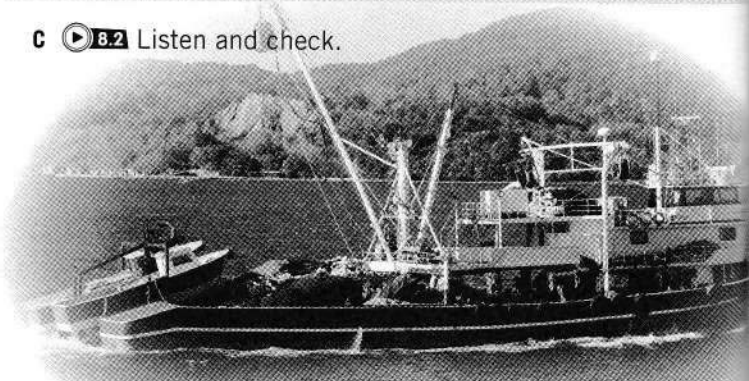

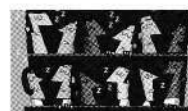

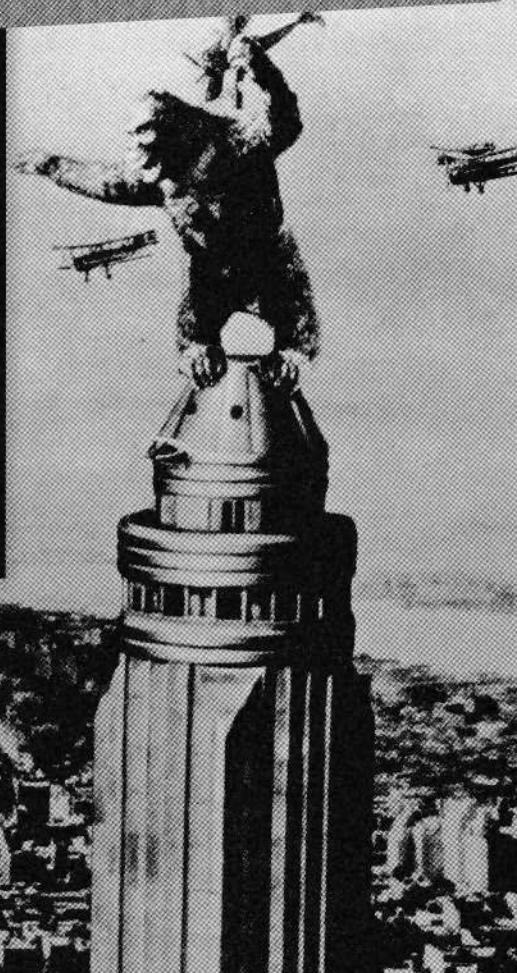

Four GREAT Financial Tools

Managing your money and keeping to a budget can be difficult, but there are some fantastic personal finance tools which can make our lives much easier. Here are some of the best, perfect for keeping track of your finances.

MoneyHealth

MoneyHealth lets you see how healthy your finances are instantly. It uses the Internet to connect to your bank accounts (although at the moment, it only works with bank accounts in the USA) and keeps track of how much money is in each account and where your money is going. But the strength of this tool is that it does much more. It also lets you create a family budget, helps you set up goals for your savings and even 'learns' what kinds of things you're spending your money on. MoneyHealth also suggests products that might be of interest, like credit cards that could save you money. The only thing it doesn't do is actually move your money around or make payments and so on. Its function is just to describe your financial situation. Unfortunately, it's an expensive program, especially as there is no mobile phone version.

MoneyGarden

This tool allows you to link up to almost 200 banks and other financial institutions. It produces graphs and other reports so you can see clearly when you spend your money, and on what. If you're on the move, there's also an app you can download to your mobile, but like the computer program, it does need an internet connection to be useful. The program is free, but you can choose to make a donation to the creators if you find it useful.

MoneyWorker

This is an app that you can run on most devices. It keeps track of your financial transactions, such as when you use your credit card, or your bank account is debited. It also helps you create an easy-to-use budget and set yourself financial goals. Since the program runs on your computer, tablet or phone, not on the Internet, you have access to your financial information even if you're not connected to the Internet. But what makes MoneyWorker different is the fact that you don't just get access to software to help you manage your money – you also join a community of users around the world who can answer your finance questions and share ideas. Although this is expensive, you can try it out for free for one month.

CheckMyMoney

This is a financial tool with one main job – to create a budget for you. Once you enter the details of your bank accounts, it analyses the data and creates a plan with a budget and suggestions for how to save money and cut your spending. Once you've set up your budget, the program helps you to stick to it. CheckMyMoney is totally free to use. However, if you want to access it from your mobile phone, or if you want to be able to link up more than two bank accounts, you have to pay quite a lot each year. It can be difficult to use if your internet connection is not very fast.

GEORGES MÉLIÈS

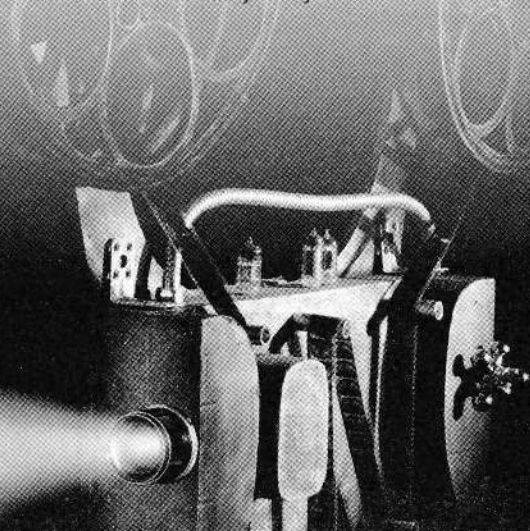
A recent Oscar-winning film by Martin Scorsese has got people around the world interested in a French director born over 100 years ago. Marie-Georges-Jean Méliès was born in Paris in 1861. From an early age, he showed a particular interest in the arts. After studying at a famous art school in Paris, Méliès continued his studies in London – his parents insisted he learn English. While in London, he developed an interest in theatre magic.

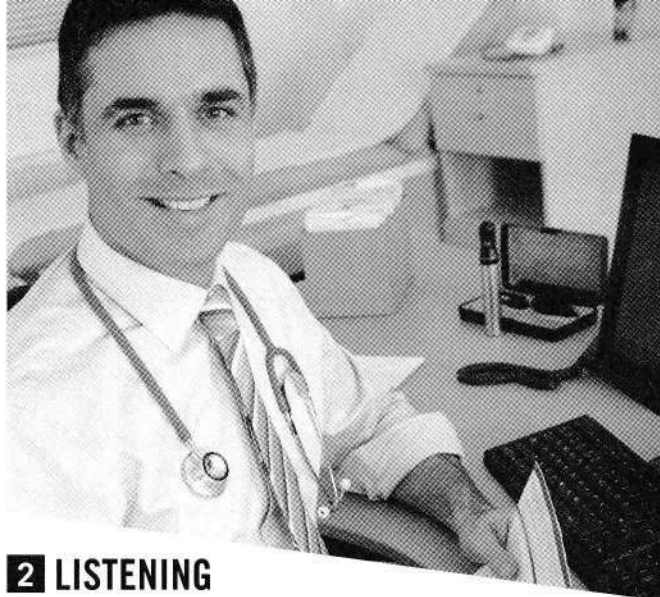
When he returned to Paris, he worked at his father's factory and took over as manager when his father retired. His position meant that he was able to save enough money to buy the famous Théâtre Robert-Houdin when it was put up for sale in 1888. From that point on, Méliès worked full time, performing shows at the theatre, using techniques which he studied while in London, as well as working on his own tricks.

When the Lumière brothers – said to be the first ever film-makers – showed their film to the public for the first time, Méliès was a member of the audience. What he witnessed clearly had a strong effect upon him. After the show, he asked the Lumière brothers if he could buy their projector, but they turned him down. However, Méliès had come to the conclusion that film-making was his future, so he went to meet Robert Paul – a British film-maker – in London. Méliès looked at Paul's camera-projector and built his own soon afterwards. Within months, Méliès was making and showing his own films.

In the autumn of 1896, an event occurred which changed the way Méliès looked at film-making. While filming a simple street scene, Méliès's camera got stuck and it took him a few seconds to solve the problem. When he later watched the film, Méliès was amazed by the effect that the incident had on what he'd filmed – objects suddenly appeared, disappeared or were transformed into other objects. It occurred to him that he could use techniques like this to change the appearance of time and space in his films. He used this discovery to create complex special effects.

Méliès made a wide range of films. He is most famous for his fantasy films, but he also made advertising films and serious dramas. However, after some time, audiences stopped finding his work so interesting or unusual, and in 1912 he gave up making films. In 1915, he was forced to turn his film studio into a theatre, and he started presenting live shows again. In 1923, he ran out of money and his theatre was knocked down. Méliès was almost totally forgotten, but in the late 1920s, his contribution to cinema was recognised by the French and he was given a special award – the Legion of Honour – and a rent-free apartment where he would live for the rest of his life. Georges Méliès died in 1938 after making over 500 films. He paid for, produced and starred in nearly every one.

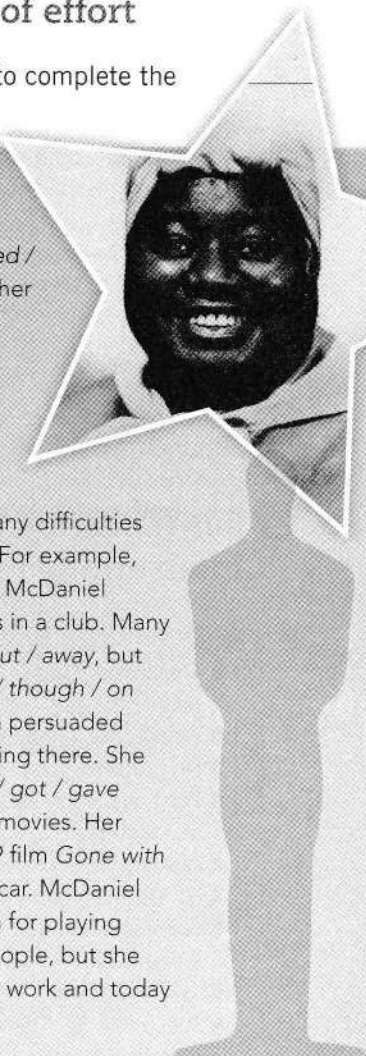

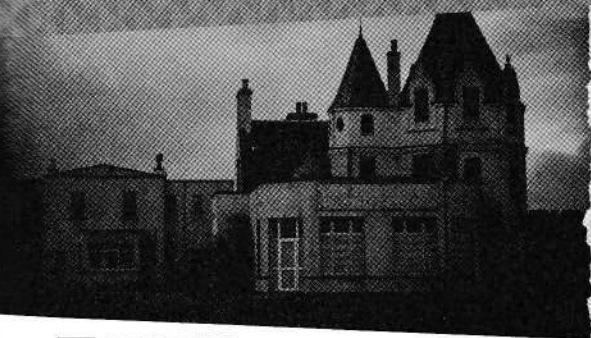

ANY REGRETS? *(Posted by Jon, 24 March)*

A recent survey of over a thousand men and women in the UK aged over 25 found that, if they could go back in time, 22% of married women would choose a different husband. Only 12% of men say they should have chosen a different wife! The survey also found that 30% of people wish they had chosen a different career, 35% wish they had chosen a different course at university and 37% wish they had saved more money. Finally, 53% said they wish they had travelled around the world more when they were younger.

I'd have to get married before I could comment on the first two statistics. But if I could go back in time, would I choose a different college course? Maybe. Would I have travelled more? Definitely, but then I think I really did all the travelling I could with the money I had. What about you? Would you have done anything different when you were younger? Do you have any big regrets?



LISA

I do sometimes think back to one exam at university. It was one of my final exams and I did OK – I didn't fail it – but I didn't get a very high mark. As a result, my final mark for my whole degree was lower than it could have been. I think I was unfortunate. I'd revised for weeks, but there was one question in the exam on a topic that I didn't really study so much – it was something that didn't interest me and we only looked at it quickly on the course, so I didn't think it would be in the exam. So even now, I often think – if only I had studied that one topic a bit more! But it didn't really matter. I still graduated and I don't think my life would have been so different if I'd got that higher mark – I suppose it would have been nice just for myself and my family.



SHANE

Personally, I think the most important thing is to enjoy your life now and not think too much about the past and how things could have been different. I sometimes think about one job interview I went for just after finishing school. I'd planned to get the train to go to the interview, but because I prefer driving I decided to take the car and ended up getting lost in a city I didn't know very well. So I arrived late, which didn't create a good impression, and I wasn't offered the position. I was devastated at the time, but two months later I got a much better job. So instead of regretting, I think we should look to the future and concentrate on overcoming problems we can actually change – I think everything happens for a reason.



TONY

I wish I'd spent more time with my children when they were really young. I had a high-pressure job with long hours and regular trips overseas. So although I tried to see my children as much as possible, I devoted a lot of my time to work because I thought I should be earning as much money as possible. On weekdays, I rarely saw them, because I left for work before they woke up and got back after they'd gone to bed. Unfortunately, I think it's often easier to say 'no' to family than it is to work. Someone once told me: 'If you lose money, you can always earn more, but if you lose time, you can never get it back.' I didn't really understand what that meant at the time, but now I'm older, I do.



MIKE

I think that when you regret something, you can use that experience to work on your weaknesses and do better in the future. You learn from what went wrong and the mistakes you made, and make sure you do things differently next time. I was really irresponsible at school. I should have studied harder. But that was a good thing, because at university, I realised my mistake, and I really worked hard and I appreciated the opportunity to study there. So in that case, regret really helped me change my behaviour.

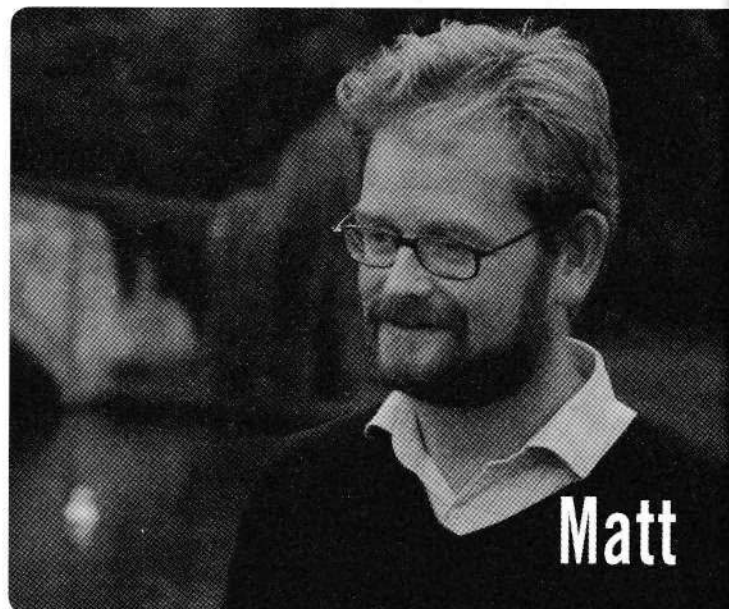

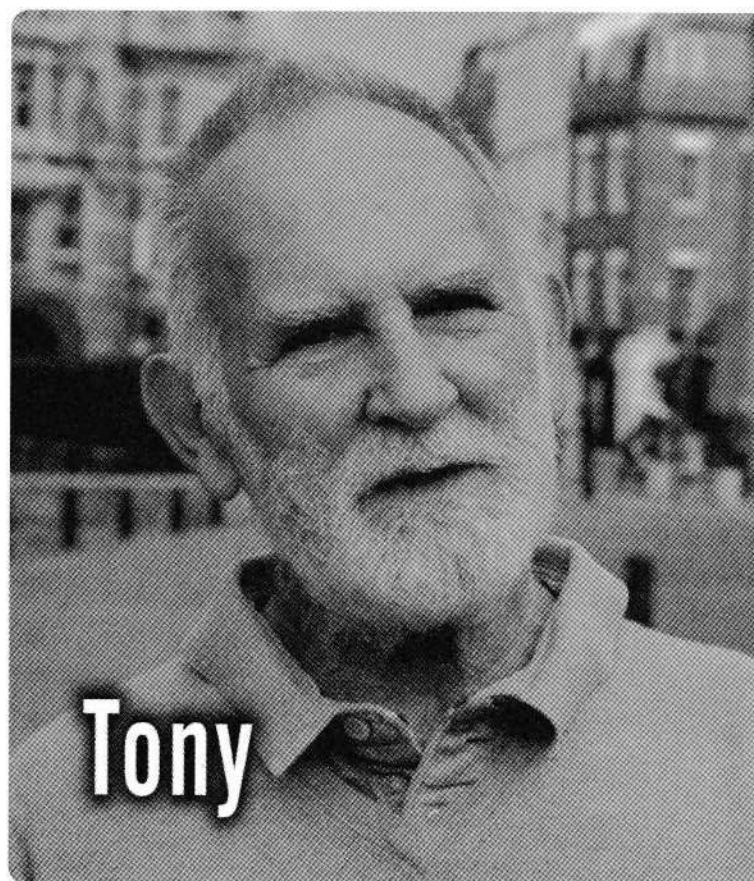

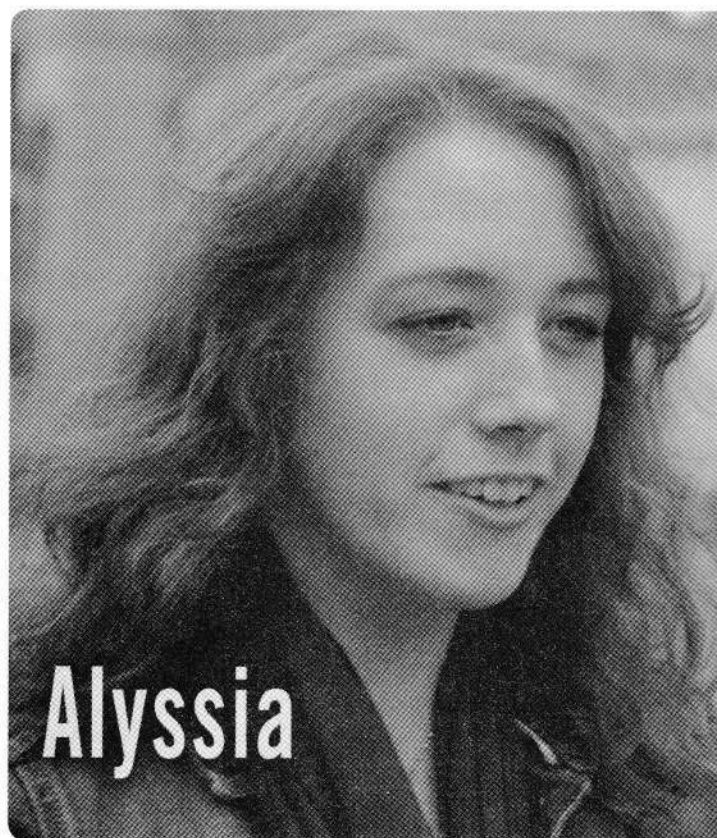

ANNOUNCER A woman reported missing over a month ago has been found safe. Alicia Lone, who works as an assistant chef, was expected home shortly after 9 pm. Her family were not initially concerned, as she had recently got involved with a sports club and often went there after work, before returning home. But when she still hadn't returned by early next morning, they contacted the police. Here's Michael Sanderson with the full report.

REPORTER When Alicia Lone went missing last month, it seemed a complete mystery. Police knew she had left work by car after her shift finished at 8:15 pm, but after that, there were no signs of her at all. But last Saturday, the mystery was solved – Lone was found alive inside her car, under over a metre of snow, where she had managed to survive for 15 days. Police say there was no problem with her car and that it seems she got into trouble when she decided, because of the heavy snow, to take a different route. But she didn't get very far – her car was found two kilometres from the main road. Police say she stopped soon after turning because the road was so bad, but was unable to turn back. She then spent a night in the car expecting to be able to get home the next day, but the snow got heavier and her car got totally stuck. Earlier, I spoke to Police Sergeant Granger, who gave us further details.

POLICE OFFICER We've only been able to speak very briefly to Lone at the hospital so we don't know the full story yet. But it seems she turned up that road to try and avoid some of the snow on the main road, but obviously she didn't get anywhere and became stuck. Very few cars travel around this area during this winter period unless there's some special reason, so she wasn't able to get anyone's attention to ask for help. So nobody saw her until yesterday, when a road maintenance crew went up there to check on the state of the road and saw the car under all the snow. When they found her, she was basically asleep. We could see she'd been eating in the car, that she had had some food in there, and she'd also been drinking melted snow. But it's incredible that she was able to survive with so little, really.

- R** Did they give you any idea at the hospital *how* she survived?
PO Well when she was found, her body temperature was very low and they think that because of the cold weather her body just kind of went to sleep, like some animals do in winter. She couldn't speak or walk when we found her. So the doctors say her body basically went to sleep, so she didn't need much food or water. But she was sure lucky.
R And do they think she's going to be OK?
PO They think so, yes – she's going to make a full recovery. She has a few problems now but she should get over them fine.
R So, it's a story with a happy ending, fortunately. We'll give you more news on Lone's condition as soon as we get it.

STEVEN Well, in an electronics store in Park Road three days ago, a young man was seen running out into the car park with a bag full of items taken from the shop. These items included MP3 players, USB sticks, tablets and a number of other expensive items. One young woman, a local student, tried to stop him after she realised that staff from the store were shouting at him. The man accidentally knocked her over as he ran past. The woman wasn't hurt, but the thief managed to escape. The young woman said she didn't see the man's face clearly because it was too dark, but that he was wearing blue jeans and a red T-shirt.

P Thank you Steven. If you think you might know who the thief was, please get in touch. Now, we're joined in the studio by Inspector Hugh Jones, who is going to tell us about a series of crimes that have occurred over the last month or so.

INSPECTOR JONES Yes, thank you. Over the last six weeks, we've unfortunately seen thieves break into six different houses at night and steal a number of items. All these incidents have happened in quite a small area – mainly in the area between Thatch Road and Crescent Drive. It's mainly jewellery that has been stolen. In each case, the people involved were able to get in through open windows. Now, I realise that in this hot weather nobody wants to keep their windows closed, but we think that most of these crimes wouldn't have happened if the owners of the houses had taken care to close all their windows before going to bed. So please get in touch if you have any information, but also – please make sure you close your windows before going to bed, or if you're going out.

P Thank you Inspector Jones. Now, to finish, an update on one of the crimes we featured in our previous programme. Well, police caught two men last week, accused of robbing the Newport Road petrol station back in February. They appeared in court, were found guilty and are now in prison. The names of the men involved were given directly to the police as a result of this programme. So thanks again for your help – if we hadn't received your calls, these crimes would not have been solved. So please call in with any information you might have on the stories we've covered tonight.

She moved to Hollywood and went ahead with her plan to be in the movies. Her most famous role was in the 1939 film *Gone with the Wind*, where she won her Oscar. McDaniel actually received a lot of criticism for playing roles which stereotyped black people, but she got on with her work and today her legacy is recognised.

One of the things I love about it is the authentic 1940s/50s atmosphere of the plot and characters. The main setting is New York, where the Corleone family are in a struggle with other Mafia families to take control of illegal businesses. The youngest son, Michael, changes from an honest citizen to the criminal head of the family after getting involved in the violence and politics of the underworld. What makes this a brilliant film is the excellent acting by Marlon Brando and Al Pacino, and the exciting plot combined with a moving soundtrack. You would never think at the start of the film that Michael will cheat and kill his way to the top. The other thing I loved is the beautiful scenery in locations ranging from Las Vegas to Sicily.
The Godfather is an amazing film, shocking and entertaining at the same time, and I highly recommend it to anybody who loves to see real film-making with a strong plot. You will immediately want to watch *Godfather II*, which some critics think is even better.
