Like many other major world cities, Curitiba in southern Brazil has had to deal with issues such as pollution, poverty, and limited public funding. However, the architect and three-times mayor of the city, Jaime Lerner, has introduced some innovative solutions.

As part of his 'Master Plan', Lerner hoped to make the city more environmentally friendly. He initiated a recycling scheme based on an 'incentives' system. In return for delivering recyclable rubbish to specified processing points, residents receive a bag of vegetables or bus tokens. As a result, Curitiba now has one of the highest recycling rates in the world. Lerner also ordered the creation of 26 urban parks. As well as curbing pollution, these control flooding. They also make an unusual sight for tourists – as a low-cost method to keep the lawns in trim, sheep are allowed to graze there!

Easing traffic congestion presented a challenge as resources were limited, but Lerner came up with the idea of a rapid transit bus system, with extra long buses and special 'pod' shaped bus stops all over the city. It runs as swiftly as an underground railway but for a tenth of the cost. Commuters were delighted.

Lerner did not win over all the city's residents immediately, however. When his plans to pedestrianise part of the centre were passed, local businesses were up in arms, fearing a reduction in profits.

Realising he needed to act quickly, Lerner had the transformation of six blocks completed



within three days. When a group of stubborn motorists attempted to drive through the new pedestrian area, Lerner arranged for local primary schools to hold a painting workshop on the streets. The drivers were forced to turn back. Luckily for Lerner, this rebellion was short-lived. The ensuing increase in turnover rapidly persuaded shop owners to change their minds. What's more, the incident also effectively demonstrated that Lerner was a mayor who could get things done.

Lerner's pragmatism and determination helped shape the Curitiba of today. The average income per capita has risen from a level that was below the Brazilian average in the 1970s to 66% above the average, and surveys indicate high levels of resident satisfaction.

So, is it all just one big success story? In some respects, Curitiba may have been too successful for its own good. People and businesses have flocked to the city, which now has more than 1.8 million residents. This has put the city under enormous strain. Forty years ago, buses transported 54,000 passengers a day. Now the number is 2.3 million. According to some experts, the transport system has reached its maximum efficiency capacity. Following a surge in complaints about the noisy and packed buses, the service is in decline. What's more, the city is struggling to provide sufficient housing, employment and school places for all its new residents.

How long Curitiba can retain its image as a model sustainable city depends on what planners will do next – one thing's for certain, the city will keep on changing.

Making a case for *Cinderella*

Cinderella is a classic fairy tale about a young girl who is mistreated by her stepmother and stepsisters. She is eventually rescued by a fairy godmother who helps her to marry a prince and live happily ever after. There are more than 700 versions of the tale.

Reveiled by both feminists and educators alike, *Cinderella* has acquired a negative reputation for being outdated, sexist romanticism. So its detractors might understandably be bewildered by the fact that the story has been revised so many times and still adorns children's bookshelves around the world today. So what is it about this particular fairy tale that continues to attract readers? Are the critics right, or are they simply missing the point?

Folk literature abounds with tales of the poor underdog who makes good, and *Cinderella* echoes this well-established theme. What sets *Cinderella* apart, however, is the way in which family relationships are foregrounded. Cinderella is victimised by a cruel stepmother and stepsisters, whom she strives in vain to please. In the story, Cinderella is a passive heroine – she does not defeat her persecutors herself but requires outside intervention to escape. This is offered by the all-good fairy godmother, who comes to the rescue, giving Cinderella the freedom to realise her dreams.

Critics of the tale often condemn the depiction of the stepmother, arguing that she sends a particularly unpleasant message to children (i.e. that stepmothers are evil). However, several psychologists advise against our interpreting the story too literally.



On another, deeper level, the stepmother and the fairy godmother can both be considered 'mother' figures. As such, they symbolise the good and bad aspects of any parent's character in a way that is intuitively accessible to young minds. Children often feel helpless when faced with a strict parent. They may feel they are being treated unjustly, particularly when sibling rivalry is involved, as in the story. The message conveyed by the fairy godmother is that there is always hope. Undoubtedly, this is a very optimistic view. Nevertheless, folk tales should not be read as realistic stories but rather as tales which appeal directly to the unconscious. This tale resonates with children because of the underlying positivity of its message.

Some modern versions of the tale have tried to address the problem of unconvincing characterisation. In Cameron Dokey's *Before Midnight: A Retelling of 'Cinderella'*, published in 2007, the stepmother and stepsisters have well-developed, multi-dimensional personalities. Although such contemporary renditions seem more up-to-date and 'natural', they lose something in the re-telling and perhaps misunderstand the purpose of fairy tales. Through reading traditional tales, children gain initial contact with social concepts such as fairness and jealousy, punishment and forgiveness – concepts which are articulated through plot rather than characterisation.

Herein lies the secret of *Cinderella*'s success. Perhaps more than any other fairy tale, it presents a highly satisfying example of justice in action. That renders it a powerful tool for developmental learning.

What does it mean to become a citizen of a different country to the one you were born in? Read about some personal experiences below.

A Geert (the Netherlands / Australia)

I made Australia my home 25 years ago and I've never regretted it. The wonderful thing about this country is that it's genuinely multicultural, and 'equal opportunities' isn't just a pretty phrase. I managed to set up my own business here, and have received support from local authorities to do so. ¹..... When the possibility of dual citizenship came up, I grabbed at the chance.

As an Australian citizen, I have the right to vote, work in public service and even seek election to Parliament, if I want to! Of course, there's nothing stopping me from going back to the Netherlands if I ever change my mind, but I can't see that happening. I'm proud of my native homeland and I'll remember it fondly. ²..... I feel like an Aussie now, through and through.



B Lesley Ann (Canada / Germany)

I met my husband while we were working for a German-owned company in Canada and we were married within the year. Four years ago the company relocated us to Germany, and we've been living here ever since. I've been made to feel very welcome in Germany, but I'm still Canadian at heart. Mathi thinks I'm crazy, but I get homesick for wild forests, ice hockey – even the cold! ³..... And I'm not ready to abandon them just yet. I'm not eligible for dual citizenship here, so if I wanted to hold German citizenship, I would have to renounce my Canadian status.

⁴..... This meant I could legally live and work in Germany indefinitely, without losing my Canadian citizenship. By rejecting the country of your birth to become the citizen of another country you are effectively taking on a new identity. ⁵.....



C Kamran (India, the USA)

I first came to the States as a student and then found work with an international company. My work required me to travel overseas a lot and it was difficult to obtain a visa each time with my Indian passport. It therefore seemed sensible to apply for US citizenship.

Unfortunately, it soon transpired that if I went down this road I would be re-classified as an Overseas Indian Citizen, not a full Indian national. I was heartbroken. ⁶..... They hardly spoke to me for months. And I felt as though I was rejecting my heritage.

After some painful soul-searching, I filled in the forms and was granted the citizenship, and I can now travel with relative ease. Yet whenever I return to India for longer stays, I have to register with an office of foreign nationals. ⁷..... But if I want to keep everyone happy – including myself – then it's a compromise I need to accept.

Tipping the balance of power

The relatively small African nation of Rwanda is a pioneer in world politics. In 2008 women held 56% of parliamentary seats in the Lower House, including the Speaker's chair, and a third of all cabinet positions, notably that of Foreign Minister and the Minister for Education. ¹..... This is the first ever time that a national parliament boasted a female majority.

So, why is a country like Rwanda ahead? One contributing factor has definitely been the support of President Paul Kagame. The genocide of 1994 devastated the country. More than 800,000 Rwandans died, with the remaining population being 70% female. ²..... Archaic legislation gave women an inferior place in society – something which Kagame was determined to redress in the 21st century.

³..... Among the new government's early achievements was the passing of several bills aimed at ending domestic violence and child abuse. A special committee for women's affairs was also set up, resulting in the abolition of discriminatory laws such as those preventing women from inheriting land.

Several neighbouring African countries have adopted similar quota systems geared towards facilitating women's entry to parliament. In South Africa and Mozambique, for example, women hold over 30% of the seats in parliament and have also made admirable strides in bringing about social reform in their countries. ⁴.....

The system has not been without its detractors. ⁵..... They argue that simply increasing the number of seats in parliament does not guarantee that women will be making decisions that matter. Various restrictions imposed on parliamentary decision-making often seriously hamper the voting power members can exert. What's more, some have argued that the system prevents women from being taken seriously as politicians and results instead in their being seen as token figures.

⁶..... In a society where it is still difficult for women to gain access to good quality education, the fact that women form the majority in parliament shows just how determined they are to bring about change.

Even the country's male population agrees that overall the nation has benefited from the increased presence of women in government. Open opposition is limited, and many men welcome the change, saying that it has brought about numerous improvements. ⁷.....

Obviously, there is still a lot of scope for improvement, but the Rwandan model sets an impressive precedent. It's one which the rest of the world will be watching with interest.

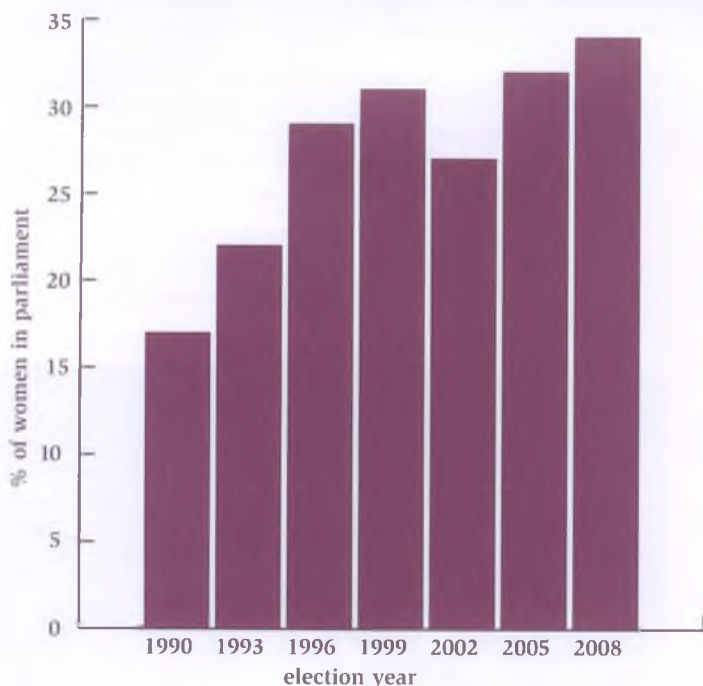

This chart ¹suggests / ²presents the percentage of women in parliament in New Zealand in the election years between 1990 and 2008. As shown in the chart, ³overall / ⁴throughout there has been a steady increase in the representation of women in parliament during this time.

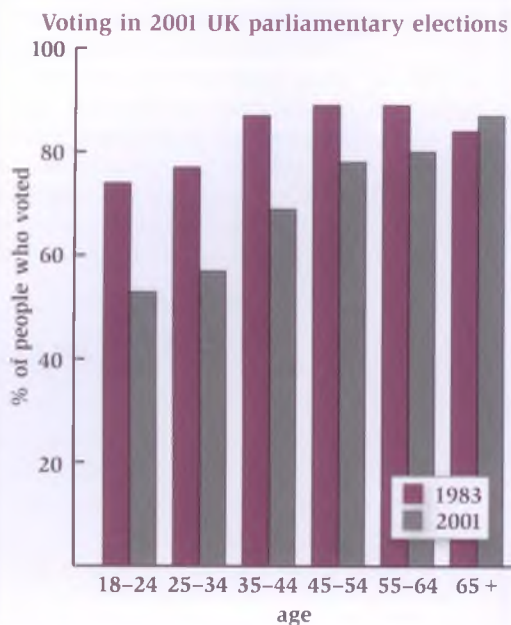

Evening Chess Club



For the last two years, membership of the evening chess club has been in decline, especially among younger members. Advertising is essential if it is to survive and thrive. The campaign should highlight the following practical details. Firstly, the club is easily accessible by car or public transport. Secondly, the membership is affordable for everyone, with discounts available for the elderly, students and those claiming disability or other benefits. Thirdly, this is a family club and parents are encouraged to bring their children. Advertising literature should also give prominence to these key selling points:



Although online chess has become increasingly popular, meeting fellow players face-to-face adds an extra dimension to the game. Potential members need to be made aware that there is an on-site coffee shop, and snacks such as fresh sandwiches and patties are also made available. Regular tournaments stimulate friendly competition and allow members to meet players from different local clubs. If sufficient interest is generated by an advertising campaign, there might be an opportunity to extend the scope of the club. It is hoped that in the future it will be possible for members to participate in evening and weekend tournaments at an international level.



The latest medical research should also be emphasised. Studies have shown that chess improves both memory and concentration, as players need to focus not only on their own strategy but also on anticipating their opponent's moves in order to gain an advantage. Studies have shown that chess may even offset the risks of such diseases as Alzheimer's in older players. Finally, chess is excellent at stress reduction. As this is an evening club, it could be promoted as the perfect way to unwind after a hard day's work.



In addition to the benefits already mentioned, chess promotes imagination and creativity, as players seek to outwit each other. Players develop problem-solving skills and the capacity to foresee the consequences of their actions. Chess also develops vital social skills among younger players, such as learning about the value of fairness and respect for their opponent. Players gain confidence as they improve their skills. Some studies have suggested that regular participation in a skills-based hobby such as chess can improve ability at maths and logic as well as overall performance at school. I would recommend that separate flyers be targeted at teachers and parents in the area, drawing particular attention to these many advantages.



For the aforementioned reasons, I strongly recommend that the council invest in further advertising to promote the club. Evening Chess Club provides local people with an enjoyable and rewarding evening activity to complement the existing sports and social programmes in the area. Increased membership would bring innumerable benefits to the community, as well as raise some much-needed additional revenue for the council's leisure programme.

Evolution and war



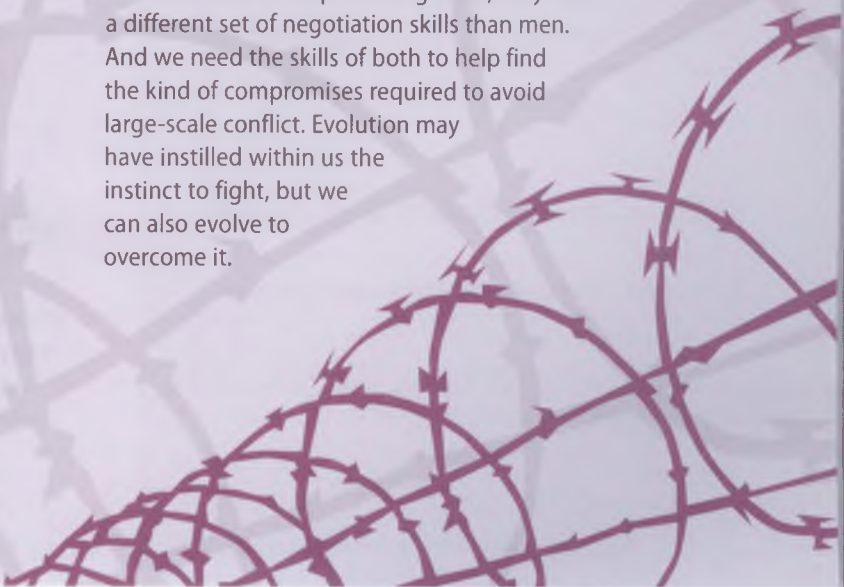
Will there ever be an end to war? The majority of the attendees on my current anthropology course answered a fatalistic 'No'. Their response was largely predictable, given that we are relentlessly bombarded with images of the military, its machinery and weapons, war-torn cities and grieving civilians. The media grimly reminds us of the sheer number of ongoing conflicts around the world; about the huge casualty rate in countries which we would probably struggle to locate on a map. There seems to be a general impression that there is no chance of a peaceful life on the planet, so long as there is human life.

It's certainly true that conflict appears to have escalated in the last decade. Some anthropologists claim that this is natural, insofar as it is an intrinsic part of human nature to be aggressive. Primates, our closest living relatives, also have a tendency towards violence. Therefore it is easy to draw the conclusion that humans fight because it is an ineradicable part of our genetic heritage. However, are we wrong to make this assumption?

While primates can display exceptional levels of brutality towards outsiders, they are also capable of reconciliation (mainly through grooming and mating) and can even avoid conflict when they perceive that there is a strategic advantage in doing so. Put more simply, apes and monkeys will only fight if they believe they can win or escape retribution. Surely, then, humans have the capacity to avoid hostility too. There is already some evidence that the world's major powers have realised the lose-lose scenario that would follow nuclear conflict, as many governments are currently discussing disarmament and arms reduction programmes.

So are there more proactive ways to avoid conflict? The more instinctively peaceful primates are the ones with access to plentiful food, and this should tell us something basic about human conflict. If human populations were more willing to distribute their food, fuel and other natural resources more equitably, there would be less reason to fight. Even if our motive for sharing is technically self-centred, this is irrelevant because in the long term it simply makes sense for us to do so.

Historically, whenever there has been more demand than supply for food, fuel or land, conflict has arisen. Therefore, in order to share these resources, it is vital that population growth is limited. One way to achieve this is through the schooling of women; statistics show that in countries where women are more educated, the birth rate tends to be lower. And with greater education, women are also able to participate more in decision-making at all levels of society, including government. While I hesitate to label women as the more peaceful gender, they have a different set of negotiation skills than men. And we need the skills of both to help find the kind of compromises required to avoid large-scale conflict. Evolution may have instilled within us the instinct to fight, but we can also evolve to overcome it.

Professor Brian Cox



Communicating science

1 One of the major problems for scientists lies in communicating the value of research to the people that matter: policymakers and the general public. In recent years, scientific organisations have come a long way in developing ways to make science more accessible to non-specialist groups.

2 Universities and research institutes now employ press officers to create user-friendly press releases which are intended to communicate new developments effectively, without hype or exaggerated claims. These professionals are able to target specific audiences, and estimate the best time for releasing information to them. They are careful to avoid over-selling a product and make sure that the press release includes information about risk as well as the limitations of a particular study. Occasionally, scientists may address an audience directly to lend weight to a campaign or initiative, but the press officer will assess whether the product will benefit from this or not.

3 The development of blogs has helped substantially in bringing science closer to the public. According to Wikipedia, the *ScienceBlogs* network is now ranked 37th among the most authoritative blogs worldwide, with two of its sections having won weblog awards. In 2008 the network launched a German-language edition, and the following year saw the introduction of *ScienceBlogs Brazil*. Released from editorial restrictions, science bloggers generally focus on areas of science that they are both passionate and knowledgeable about. They often write about science in an accessible, lively manner, and it is this that perhaps most attracts members of the public. Ed Yong's *Not Exactly Rocket Science*, for instance, is imbued with the writer's enthusiasm and down-to-earth attitude towards the subject. His chatty, youthful style appeals to a wide range of readers, whereas a formal, two-page article in a science journal might be neglected.

4 Television has also boosted the image of science. Early pioneers such as Jacques Cousteau, whose beautifully filmed documentaries opened up the oceans to millions, quickly realised the potential of TV to make science come alive for viewers. Other science disciplines have eagerly followed suit. Entertaining presenters carry out daring experiments or explore amazing scientific phenomena in order to attract attention. High-profile personalities such as Brian Cox, once famous for playing music in D:Ream, have also been instrumental in bringing science into the realm of popular culture. Now working in the field of physics, Brian is presenter of the BBC TV series *Wonders of the Solar System*. His background means that his face is not only well known to younger viewers but is also deemed cool. Other organisations have been utilising the power of visual media via the internet. For example, *SciVee* offers scientists video services to create online presentations of their research.

5 Nevertheless, despite this progress, communication remains one of science's biggest stumbling blocks. A tendency towards a more old-fashioned academic approach means that scientists often underestimate the importance of becoming media-savvy, leaving them vulnerable to missing out on public and financial support for their research. Perhaps it is time that universities addressed this problem, and thought about adding communications training to the curriculum.

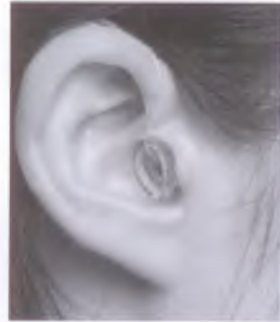

87. • The Venus Fly Trap

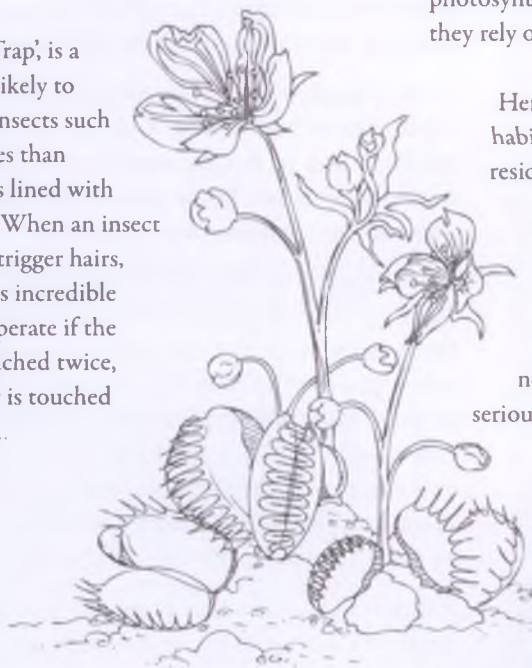
Dr Lars Bohr, Department of Botany, Aalborg University, Denmark

A great green jaw, red-rimmed, lies wide open and perfectly still on the forest floor. The sweet smell it gives off is **alluring**. It is not long before an inquisitive creature arrives and unwittingly steps inside. In an instant, the mouth has closed and the victim is sealed within. ¹..... Sound horrifying? It's just nature. Be grateful that the Venus Fly Trap is a mere six centimetres high.

Even people who otherwise have little interest in plants are familiar with Venus Fly Traps. For small children, the temptation of poking the open 'mouths' is irresistible. ²..... When I'm lecturing on botany, I find that the name of the plant draws more attention than many other of my special interests. So what is it about the Venus Fly Trap that arouses such fascination?

Well, firstly, the idea of a carnivorous plant is intriguingly gruesome. When specimens first arrived in Europe in the 18th century, many scientists could not conceive of a plant with an insect diet, as it **confounded** their beliefs about natural order. This species seemed a hideous anomaly. ³..... Actually, more than 630 species of 'meat-eating' plants exist.

The name, 'Venus Fly Trap', is a **misnomer**, as it's more likely to consume ground-level insects such as beetles and millipedes than actual flies. ⁴..... This is lined with a number of tiny hairs. When an insect crawls onto one of the trigger hairs, the leaf snaps shut. This incredible mechanism will only operate if the same hair is rapidly touched twice, or a second nearby hair is touched within 20 seconds. ⁵.....



Here's another fact. The Venus Fly Trap is actually rather rare, so much so that local conservationists want it officially classified as 'vulnerable', one step away from 'endangered'. The plant's habitat is a mere 100 miles across northern South Carolina and southern North Carolina in the USA, where they live in sandy, acidic soil that offers little in the way of minerals. ⁶..... Constant sunlight is also a necessity as their modified leaves are poor at photosynthesis. And to gain sufficient access to sunlight, they rely on regular forest fires to reduce other vegetation.

Herein lies one of the threats to their survival. Their habitat has been encroached on by development, and residents are understandably keen to put out any fires which might start. Then, many of the wetlands have been drained to **make way** for golf courses, parking lots and hotels. On top of this, there is relentless **poaching**. ⁷..... There are fines in place to deter their theft but local authorities do not have the manpower to set up regular patrols. If serious action isn't taken soon, the legendary plant may soon only exist in folklore.

In American English, *quite* almost always means *completely* when used as a modifying adverb.

Hear it from the experts: what to do when you've made a mistake

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What to do when you've made a mistake?

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Experts' Tips

Three leading career experts offer some tips on how to deal with mistakes in the workplace.

STEP ONE – ¹..... Carina Blake, management consultant

It's inevitable that at some point, you will make a mistake at work. This is only human. Even bosses make mistakes, so they won't necessarily be as angry or hostile as you might expect. A lot depends on what you do to ameliorate the situation. Firstly, face up to the problem. Acknowledge to yourself what has happened and take a few moments to think about how you can handle any problems which may arise as a consequence. Then go and inform your boss of the situation and tell her your plans for dealing with it. Being honest and accepting responsibility will reduce the amount of anger aimed at you. Don't pass the buck and place blame on others even if they are partly responsible. Getting colleagues into trouble will not make you a popular member of the team. If colleagues feel they can trust you, they will be more likely to support you.

STEP TWO – ²..... Paulo Berusa, careers officer

Most managers accept that staff will make mistakes at some point, but what concerns them more is that any mistakes should be rectified quickly and effectively. The golden rule is to talk it over with your boss and show a willingness to make amends. Make sure that correcting a mistake doesn't interrupt the overall flow of work you are doing, however, by doing it in your own time. Work through your lunch hour and stay late if necessary. If people notice the extra effort you put in, then they'll respect you for it. Organise your time carefully to avoid further problems. If you're very busy, keep a prioritised list of things to do and delete items as you complete them. It is also prudent to keep a note of any corrective procedures you follow in case you need to explain your actions later on.

STEP THREE – ³..... Bernhard Bouwman, CEO

Mistakes needn't be the end of the world – they can be opportunities for development. Don't waste time feeling guilty, but try to take a more constructive approach. Think: what has this experience taught me? Where can I go from here? But be realistic and don't make promises you can't keep. Failed promises will not curry favour with anyone and could result in your boss losing faith in your ability to do the job. Don't be afraid to ask for assistance if necessary – many people are flattered to be asked! In particular, listen carefully to any advice your boss may give you on how to avoid making the same mistake again. That way you'll be sure to impress in future. Finally, don't become complacent. No one's perfect, and it's easy to make mistakes when you take your eye off the ball. It's vital to keep abreast of the latest developments and skills at work, so make sure you keep learning and keep making progress.

INCREASING TRENDS

A CURE FOR cyberchondria?

- 1 It started with a bit of casual itching and scratching on the scalp, but after a week it had spread to the back of my neck, enough to lead me to my laptop. Annoying as it was, I was reluctant to take up my doctor's time with such a silly complaint and then have a wasted journey only to be informed that it would clear up by itself and that, no, antibiotics would be of no use at all.
- 2 As soon as I'd tapped in 'online self-diagnosis', the search engine provided me with over 11.5 million results. And in the fraction of the time normally spent in my GP's waiting room absorbing the *Woman's Weekly* – and plenty of germs – I was able to find a site that would provide a free assessment in the comfort of my swivel chair, and with no need for an appointment.
- 3 I scrolled down the series of 'Yes / No / Go to' questions until I eventually reached a description exactly matching my symptoms. As I clicked on 'More Information', I was hit with a prognosis I'd never anticipated. The worst case scenario was complete hair loss. At best, it would be bare patches. I couldn't have been more alarmed.
- 4 I headed off to the doctor for what I thought would be a blood test but which turned out to be a valuable lesson in not believing everything you read on the internet. It took him less than a minute to guess at and locate head lice. I was simultaneously relieved to know that I would be keeping my hair, and horrified to know that it was being occupied. I guess it's not just homework that kids bring home from school these days.
- 5 I learnt my lesson, but for some the preoccupation with looking up every twitch, ache and spasm has led to a new form of hypochondria. Dubbed 'cyberchondria' by the print media back in 2000, this particular affliction has increased exponentially. Although most people's main port of call is still the doctor's surgery, it's estimated that health worries are now the second most researched topic on the web. This is truly a serious concern when approximately 25% of the medical information online is thought to be misleading.
- 6 Once upon a time, hypochondria required time and effort: you had to go to the library to research your ailments and painstakingly go through the glossary. Now it's just a matter of a few clicks of a mouse. But whereas your doctor will make a diagnosis taking into consideration your age, appearance and medical history, a search engine will rely simply on algorithms. These come up with results graded according to popularity or numbers of key words. So the most highly ranked hits might actually be for very genuine diseases, which are nonetheless extremely rare. One minute you think you've come down with the flu, the next you're under attack from sub-tropical, flesh-eating bacteria. Time spent going to the doctor's for peace of mind suddenly seems fair enough.

To the Editor

The article *An end to play* in the June edition of your magazine lacked balance and perspective in the way it presented the role of video gaming in young people's lives. If it was your writer's intention to overwhelm already guilt-laden parents, he certainly did a good job of it.

The popular media has long portrayed the players of video games as socially inadequate, under-achieving young males who are doomed to remain glued to a screen for much of their waking lives, without the prospect of any kind of career or normal human relationship. Such tired stereotypes should have no place in serious writing. Moreover, journalists such as your writer are all too keen to assume a strong correlation between violent or criminal tendencies and familiarity with shooting games. Research by the well-regarded sociologists Ian Macquarie and Karina Rylands (published 2009), amongst others, has proved that societal and even genetic factors have much more of an influence.

The truth is that the appeal of gaming is not limited to those of a particular gender or age. Even I enjoy it now and again! It's a popular form of entertainment and is a far more mentally stimulating way of spending your time than watching television, which, funnily enough, was also accused of being 'the downfall of culture' when it first began appearing in homes. Indeed, to deny even infants

access to video games is to hold them back. It has always been the case that game play engages developing minds in the learning process, and modern technology offers exciting new opportunities in this regard.

I would like to present you with some areas of published research your writer chose to neglect, but which is nevertheless widely available to those of us who take a genuine interest in our children's social and intellectual development. First of all, scientists from the University of Wisconsin have established in a key study that traditional video games actually sharpen the mind, and not only in the case of young people. It has been shown that, by regularly engaging in this type of activity, the elderly are more likely to retain cognitive skills such as the ability to reason and multi-task into later life. Surely this is a highly desirable benefit, which could even lead to savings in health care?

It may also surprise you to know that, contrary to your claims that video gaming automatically leads to childhood obesity, games are now increasingly being used for fitness training in the USA. In fact West Virginia has provided such a game to all the middle schools under its authority. People run, walk, jump, squat and dance on special mats, following instructions on a screen. When the weather impedes an outdoor physical education programme, children can still take indoor exercise using these 'active' games, increasing their range of options.

I am not saying that – taken to excess – gaming does not have some serious side effects, but enjoyed in moderation, the advantages are numerous. The one-sided view of video gaming that your magazine seems to favour is simply frustrating.

1 My grandfather, Apostolos, was born to a very loving and close-knit family near the village of Haraki, on Rhodes, in 1931. The island was occupied by German soldiers in the 1940s, which 'brought a time of great hardship for the family. His father joined the resistance and went away to fight, never to return. This meant that Apostolos, his sister and mother often had to go and hunt for food to survive.



2 Then he and his sister 'were arrested on suspicion of spying. Aged fourteen, he was sent to prison, where he eventually befriended one of his guards, a boy not much older than himself. One night, he helped Apostolos escape but he wouldn't talk to him or look at him. It wasn't until the next day that my grandfather discovered that his sister had been shot. He was devastated and for many years, 'he was consumed by grief.

3 Eventually, 'struggling to make sense of it all, he wrote a book about what had happened on the island. 'It is a moving account of the Occupation, which 'pays tribute to the courage and compassion shown by a few on both sides, like his sister and the guard. Apostolos passed away in 2005 but he will always be remembered by me and many others from my neighbourhood as a hero.

A matter of perspective?

by Professor Xavier Broudel



Cleopatra

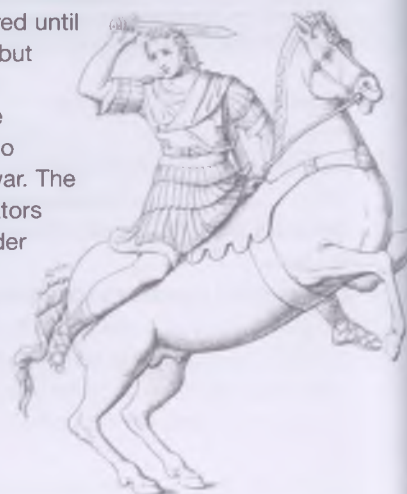
Views of Cleopatra have largely depended on changes in the perception of women in power. The earliest historians, influenced by a general mistrust of women rulers, portrayed Cleopatra as an evil seductress who manipulated men for political gain. In *Antony and Cleopatra*, Shakespeare depicts her as a helpless victim, promoting the patriarchal views of women's

fragility common to his time. Films and TV programmes present us with an ambitious, resourceful politician who was by-and-large devoted to her people, thus reflecting the prevailing expectations of women in contemporary society.

Alexander the Great, b.356, d.323 BC

Alexander the Great is generally hailed by Europeans as having 'civilised the barbaric east', by enlightening that part of the world with the more sophisticated Greek culture. However, the territories in Asia that he conquered view him as an evil usurper of power, a murderer and pillager on a par with Genghis Khan. Alexander admired Achilles and modelled himself on the warrior hero, whose reckless display of courage inspired soldiers in battle.

Such values were admired until the Second World War, but today history books are more likely to favour the peace-loving Hector who tried his best to avoid war. The new wave of commentators either condemn Alexander for committing innumerable atrocities or contend that he was comparatively fair and reasonable for a soldier of his era.



Sir Francis Drake,

b.1540, England, d.1596

A controversial figure even in his day, Francis Drake is viewed in the UK as a heroic rogue, while to the Spanish he is El Draque, a ruthless pirate. His methods were unlawful, but Queen Elizabeth I, who made enough money from his exploits to pay off the national debt, was prepared to turn a blind eye, and indeed he became a national hero in the eyes of many. Several modern historians claim he was ruthless, and criticise him for his involvement in the slave trade. However, conflicting accounts suggest that Drake in fact made friends in the Caribbean with many escaped African slaves, who then helped him attack the Spanish bases there. The truth of this is still open to speculation.



Marie Antoinette,

b.1755, France, d.1793

Marie Antoinette was plagued by scandal throughout her short life. An Austrian princess, her marriage was one of political convenience. French people viewed her with suspicion from the start, and she was much maligned. Early historians claimed she was unfaithful, though modern scholars agree there is no solid evidence to support this. She was also falsely accused of fraud, a libel which aroused the sympathy of a leading historian of the day, Edmund Burke, who portrayed Marie Antoinette as a helpless victim. Modern historians have uncovered accounts of her showing kindness to the poor, yet Coppola's recent film features a frivolous woman who took little seriously. Surrounded as it was by rumour and gossip, the truth about her life is unlikely ever to be fully unravelled.

EXAMINING BIAS IN THE NEWS

The top priority of any newspaper is to sell. Never before has this been as important as it is today. The sudden growth of online news reporting means that printed newspapers have to struggle to maintain circulation figures. As a result, they are heavily dependent on commercial concerns and marketing. While many journalists and editors try to be as objective in their approach as possible, a certain amount of bias is inevitable. Be aware of this and keep a lookout for certain characteristics and you will become a more discerning reader.



A

Editors know that eye-catching 'shock stories' shift more copies. For this reason, you are more likely to see news of a bombing or the latest victim of a serial killer on the front page than an account of firemen saving someone's life. Similarly, coverage of national parliamentary elections will take precedence over everything else, including major world news. Positioning other stories further back subconsciously affects the reader's view of their significance. What's more, restrictions on the number of stories in any one issue may mean that some stories will simply be omitted.

B

Some newspapers may try to avoid seeming overtly sensationalist, but they still influence the reader indirectly by using language to convey excitement, to show approval or to criticise. For example, a public demonstration attended by 560 protesters can be described in positive terms with 'Over 500 people took to the streets to protest against the proposal' or, conversely, in a negative way with 'The protest march was marked by a poor turnout of fewer than 600 people'. It all depends on the journalist's point of view. Headlines are often particularly revealing in this respect and are often the deciding factor for a reader when considering whether or not to buy the newspaper. Editors will aim to make stories sound more dramatic, knowing that the headline 'Six die in train crash' will probably attract more attention than 'Two trains collide outside station'.

C

Newspapers make choices about the kind of pictures they show in order to influence public opinion. A photograph of a presidential candidate, for instance, could be taken from a flattering or unflattering perspective. At a football match, the camera angle can be narrowed onto a scene of hooliganism, suggesting that violence was widespread, or widened to play it down as one isolated incident.

D

Newspapers rely heavily on advertising for revenue. Those that receive a large part of their income from a particular company are therefore unlikely to publish information to the detriment of that company's products. They may even include press releases promoting the firm's latest creation, while ignoring that of its chief competitor.

To obtain a broader view of what's happening in the world, it is best to read widely. Luckily, major newspapers now have their own websites, so it is easier than ever to access information on a news item from a range of sources.

responsible?

We asked four alumni from the Williams Business and Accountancy School what corporate responsibility means to them.

A Jason

Corporate responsibility? I think it's just a buzz word. Maybe I shouldn't be saying this, given that I've recently changed direction and decided to enter the corporate world myself. I know that some corporations profess to be bringing huge benefits to local people, and maybe some are. However, in other cases, they're paying low wages or undercutting small, family-run firms who can't compete. It may not be a pretty image, but that's the nature of capitalism. I'd like to hope I won't end up as part of this process, but I suspect it's inevitable. Essentially, your biggest responsibility is ultimately to return value to your stakeholders. Positive employee relations are desirable, but not actually a legal requirement in many countries.

B Anya

Thanks to my sister, I've recently had a shift in thinking. As far as corporate responsibility is concerned, I'm no longer a complete sceptic! Christina recently transferred to an overseas branch. She was surprised and delighted to discover the branch was running local programmes to improve basic literacy skills amongst employees as well as to conserve the environment. She's now currently retraining as a teacher and moving over to that side of things. The branch isn't a bunch of do-gooders and this isn't just for show. They genuinely seem to be making a difference. Now that I've seen this side of corporate responsibility, I've been persuaded to give it a go myself in later life, although I'll stick to Plan A and pursue a solid career in finance for a few years first.

C Andre

For me, what it comes down to is sustainability. Whatever your product, it shouldn't have a detrimental effect on the planet. Many companies make a big noise about how much cash they give away to charity, but they should implement changes in the way they make their profits in the first place. Quite aside from the ethical arguments, there's also a sound commercial incentive here. These days the consumer has access to far more information than ever before thanks to the internet, so if a scandal goes viral, it'll tarnish a reputation forever. Companies are well aware of that. For that reason, more are starting to face up to their responsibilities – or so they claim.

D Lisa

In the USA, corporations often support community development projects by donating books or equipment to schools. However, this apparent altruism is not all it professes to be. There's a large grey area between corporate giving and company branding. Nowadays every corporate website includes a summary of so-called 'core values'; vague descriptions of how they're 'giving back' to society. I can't help thinking they're obscure for a reason and that it's all just spin for good PR. I'm particularly irritated by the claims of fast food companies, and if I thought it would do any good, I'd join a protest march. But what can you do against these giants? They pretend to be concerned with obesity levels while promoting special offers on larger portions. The hidden agenda is clearly to boost margins. It's an insult to consumer intelligence.

A Swakopmund, Namibia

This seaside town has reinvented itself as a year-round adventure playground thanks to its wild surf and rough desert terrain. Quad-biking is the main attraction, but go out into the wilderness by yourself and you're likely to become utterly disoriented in the endless shifting sand. No need to get a map – simply hire one of the local guides, who are very good value and can also point out the disconcerting Horses Graveyard, a site where the sun-bleached remains of hundreds of horses from the Second World War still lie. It's an eerie sight which I've been told will haunt your dreams for a long time.

B El Caminito del Rey, Spain

Nerves of steel are required to take the pathway, three kilometres long and three metres wide, that runs along the steep walls of a narrow gorge in El Chorro, Malaga. Getting lost in the view is not an option – you'll be too busy concentrating. Closed for many years after several walkers fell to their deaths from its decaying paths, it re-opened in 2015 after extensive renovation. The new secure walkway and compulsory safety equipment mean visitors are no longer dicing with death, but the path is just as narrow, and still clings precariously to the sheer cliffs over 100 metres above the river below, so vertigo sufferers should give this one a miss!

In the mid 90s, there were 400 million hearing-impaired people globally, of which 70 million belonged to the 700 million strong European population, and 25 million to the 300 million people in North America. The European figures are thought to rise to 95 million within the next decade.

Remarkably, only one in five hearing-impaired Europeans uses an aid. There are a number of reasons for this: people may underestimate the severity of their own problem, or they worry that aids will look ugly – this is the biggest issue for newer generations – or perhaps they simply don't realise that help is available.

Hear-It runs an international website that aims to increase public awareness of hearing problems and help those who need it. We regularly publish articles about new products, and allow users to post their own comments about equipment they've used. We also give directions to online shops where people can purchase the products. The main message we try to convey is that, in most cases, problems can be improved by the right equipment.

Let me tell you about Ashkan Tehrani. An Iranian engineer, Ashkan suffered his hearing loss in silence for many years. After coming across our website, he realised it didn't have to be that way. Now, fully kitted out in the latest aids fitted with wi-fi technology, Ashkan not only works in engineering, but also teaches in the subject – and his confidence has taken off, too. Obviously, we can't work miracles – Ashkan needs to use special recording equipment and transmitters in lectures. But this is a comparatively small inconvenience when compared to the gains. You can read more about Ashkan on our homepage. His story is quite inspiring.

Of course, scientists are making breakthroughs in the field of hearing all the time. If you visit our site, you can read

about some fascinating new developments in America. There, scientists have discovered that our skin also helps us to listen, by picking up vibrations in sounds. They realised that the full listening process actually involves sight and touch as well as hearing, in order to provide the brain with a full impression of what sounds are being produced. So in the future, we may be able to look forward to a very different range of products developed in response to these findings.

This is just a small selection of the kind of information you can find on our site. It's likely that either you or someone close to you will experience hearing loss at some point, so I'm sure you'll find it an invaluable resource. Now, if I may take a few questions ...

- R: So, Penelope, how difficult is it to get started?
- P: Well, the golden rule when choosing your subject is to find them fascinating, never mind whether they're historically important or – much worse – fashionable. Then concentrate on the key moments in their life and begin your research by focusing on the details surrounding them. Remember, you've got to win the reader over too, and the scandalous and shocking will attract more than the everyday.
- R: What about when the subject's a famous historical figure? Isn't there a danger that it's all been written already?
- P: The trick there is to uncover new information or to approach your subject from an original angle. Otherwise, your book will only be of interest to academics rather than booksellers or the general public. This is particularly challenging since you will need to present a different interpretation of what may be already well-documented facts.
- R: So, what are the difficulties involved in researching someone's life?
- P: Well, the main worry is organisation, although getting funding and especially time are also big concerns! You've got to plan or you'll never succeed. As soon as you can, create digital files of different periods of their life and – sorry, even before that – make a timeline. It's amazing how difficult it is to keep events in order! Finally, sort out any hard copy into similar periods.
- R: Hard copy? Do you mean other biographies, history books and the like?
- P: No ... sorry! This can mean books, of course, but also things such as letters, diaries – especially those if there are any, photographs, newspaper clippings, and so on. It may be accompanied by transcripts of interviews with people who knew your subject.
- R: Ah, I imagine that's very exciting.
- P: It can be, yes. But it's also tricky. You'd expect interviewees to feel excited too, or enthusiastic, yet they're actually often very reserved initially, becoming friendlier later. They may not like being recorded and so won't say much during the official interview. You need to be prepared for what they may say afterwards, once they relax. Then they often come out with the really interesting titbits. It's vital to show them respect for their feelings and also gratitude for their time. Remember, you may need to come back to them for more information or to corroborate another person's testimony. It can be a long process!
- R: So, what's special about your work, then, Penelope?
- P: There's something wonderful about entering the world of an historical great, you know, like Napoleon, Alexander the Great, Genghis Khan. For a while, you are privy to part of the power these great leaders and politicians wielded,

and that can be awe-inspiring. Another aspect is the thrill of the chase, as it were. It's almost like you're a detective hunting an elusive suspect, especially when you don't know if he's guilty or not. You might suddenly uncover information about him that completely changes your view and forces you to follow another line of research altogether. I get a real buzz out of that.

R: Penelope Fowles, fascinating, thank you. Now ...

A word of warning, though. Never try to get a new company going while you're still employed elsewhere. I'll tell you why. If you see your business as a back-up plan or a compensation for your boring regular work, you'll never commit yourself 100% and, no, your new business won't be successful. It's all or nothing. So, what ...

It's just as important to know why businesses fail as why they thrive. Many failures occur when entrepreneurs lack sufficient management knowledge. They might be good at dealing with customers, but they lack expertise in handling hard-to-manage employees as well as in financial matters.

The next reason – and you won't believe how often this occurs – but many people have no real idea about how much capital they need. Putting in long hours won't necessarily help you if you sink too far into debt. So you really need to be realistic about this.

People's failure to consider location can also lead to bankruptcy. They haven't thought about how accessible the store or office is, or how close they are to competitors. So don't just choose a location because it doesn't need much renovation, or because it's close to suppliers – or your home!

Now, most businesses these days have the sense to set up a website, with opening hours, addresses and so on. So why do some forget to put up a catalogue, too? If customers can't find one of these, they'll soon look elsewhere. And when times are tough, worry less about promoting your luxury products and services, and more about highlighting your discounts. You'll keep your income up that way. Remember, entrepreneurs who overcharge their customers never see them again.

The final point that I'm going to make is that rather than focusing on short-term business you want to encourage repeat business. That's the way to make your company grow.

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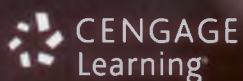
